


1. POLICYMIX Call to action







Policy cycle - steps and evaluation criteria

Instruments' public-private benefits




PRIVATE net benefit of landuse change








Example 2: Ecological Fiscal Transfers (EFT)




Brazil (since 1991)

14 out of 26 states consider protected areas for distributing state-level value-added tax to municipalities ("ICMS Ecológico")


Portugal Local Finances Law 2007

- promote sustainable local development
- Natura 2000 and other nationally protected areas as indicators for fiscal transfers to municipalities





Ecological Fiscal Transfers in the policy mix





Governance levels addressed: governments at different levels – national / state / local

Associated with: Constitution, Protected area regulation

Potential complement: PES – private actors;

Conservation support prog. – management costs

Relevant: Good information policy to increase knowledge and motivation of actors addressed



5. POLICYMIX findings in brief

There is evidence that different protection efforts might be complimentary, i.e. PES increasing the effectiveness of buffer zones around protected areas." (Costa Rica)

"Forest owners conserve forest with a mix of
emotional bequest, intrinsic, ethical and
entrepreneurial self-interested motives" (Finland)

"Policymixes can provide wider **options** and opportunities for decision makers to engage in conservation, but also deal with **uncertainties** inherent to their economic activities" (Portugal)
